PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE PRIMARY

The Town of Bloomfield's Presidential Preference Primary shall be held on April 2, 2024.

The polls will be open between the hours of 6:00 AM and 8:00 PM. You must be an enrolled member in the Democratic and Republican Party to vote in your party's primary. Party members will cast their votes at the following places in the districts specified.

Absentee ballots will be available, as provided by law, in the office of the Town Clerk. Applications for absentee ballots are available at the Town Clerk's Office as well as online at the Town Clerk's page on the Town of Bloomfield's website at www.bloomfieldct.gov click "Voting and Elections" on the menu on the left side of our page and then select "Absentee Voting". Click on Secretary of the State's website.

Absentee ballots become available 21 days before the primary so don't wait until the last minute to request one. You can start requesting applications for absentee ballots at this time for the April Primaries.

PROSSER LIBRARY PROJECT TO BREAK GROUND



A NEW LIBRARY EXPERIENCE IS ON ITS WAY...BOOK IT!

The much anticipated renovation project for the Prosser Library has been given the green light to move forward, and construction will begin shortly after the New Year.

The Prosser Library, which is located at 1 Tunxis Avenue in the Town Center, will be fitted with modern amenities, as well as meeting rooms, group work room, study spaces, and dedicated areas for teens.

The project, which is expected to take over a year to complete, will be a staple of the Town's revitalization efforts of its town center area. For years, the Town Council and the residents of Bloomfield have expressed their desire for updates to the town libraries and the renovation of Prosser Library is the first step in achieving this goal.

For now, the Bloomfield Public Library is operating out of two temporary locations, one at the MetLife Atrium at 1300 Hall Boulevard and the second is a tech space at 330 Park Ave.

WINTER SAFETY TIPS

As the holidays arrive and winter begins to set in, the Bloomfield Center Fire Department and Blue Hills Fire Department want to remind residents that it's essential to ensure that homes are heated and decorated safely. **According to the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA), half of home heating fires occur during December, January, and February.** Reduce the risk of winter fires by following these safety tips:



CANDLES

December is the peak time of year for home candle fires. The top two days for home candle fires are Christmas Eve and Christmas. On average, 7,900 home candle fires are reported each year.

- Keep candles 12 inches away from anything flammable.
- Never leave a burning candle unattended.

PORTABLE SPACE HEATERS

Many people use portable space heaters to stay warm. Though convenient, space heaters can also bring fire hazards to clothing, furniture, curtains, and other household items. Be sure to:

- Turn off portable heaters before leaving the room or going to sleep.
- Plug space heaters directly into the wall. Do not use an extension cord.
- Plug only one space heater into an outlet at a time and
- Use space heaters with an automatic shut-off feature.

FIREPLACES AND WOOD STOVES

Wood-burning stoves and fireplaces offer warmth and comfort but can also pose a safety risk. Be sure to:

- Install wood stoves according to the manufacturer's instructions or have a professional install the unit.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from your fireplace or wood stove.
- Make sure your fireplace has a screen to stop sparks from flying into the room and
- Dispose of ashes in a metal container.

ADDITIONAL FIRE SAFETY TIPS:

- Test smoke alarms at least once a month to ensure they are operating.
- Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month and
- Never use an oven to heat your home.
- Smoke alarms should be located in every bedroom and common area on each floor of a home. Mount them at least 10 feet from the stove and less than 12 inches from the ceiling, away from windows, doors, and ducts.
- Be sure to purchase smoke alarms with the label of a reputable testing agency, like Underwriters Laboratories.
- Carbon monoxide is a deadly, odorless gas that can come from anything in the home that burns fuel. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each bedroom and on every level of the home.
- Make sure vents for your gas appliances, such as fireplaces, dryers, stoves, and furnaces, are free and clear of snow or debris.

SNOW BLOWER

- Always start your snow blower outside, never in the garage, in case of fire, explosion or carbon monoxide poisoning
- Before it snows, clear objects from your driveway that might become projectiles.
- If using an electric-powered snow blower, choose a path away from the cord.
- If the blower gets jammed, turn it off and clear the jam with a shovel or rake handle. Never your hand
- Keep your hands away from all moving parts.
- Do not drink alcohol and use the snow blower.
- Be proactive and wear personal protective equipment (goggles, safety glasses, and gloves)
- Refuel your snow blower when it is off and has cooled down, never when running.

SNOW SHOVELING

- Stretch out beforehand to warm up your muscles and take it slow.
- Shovel only fresh, powdery snow; it's lighter.
- Push the snow rather than lift it.

SNOW SHOVELING (CONT.)

- If you do lift it, use a small shovel or only partially fill the shovel.
- Lift with your legs, not your back. Keep your back straight, bending at the hips.
- Wear layers and remove them as you get warmer.
- Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated while shoveling.
- Pace yourself and be sure to take frequent breaks.

FURNACE

- Don't wait until the cold weather to maintain your furnace.
- Replace the air filter in your furnace each month.
- Clean your air vents and ducts. Remove the vent covers and use the extension hose to vacuum out dust.
- Inspect the blower belt for cracks and have it replaced if necessary.
- Program your thermostat to lower the temperature when you're away or asleep. According to the Consumer Energy Center, using this type of thermostat could save 20 to 75 percent on your furnace's operating costs.
- Inspect the exhaust flue outdoors to ensure it is free of obstructions such as branches or animal nests.
- Keep the area around your furnace unit free of debris and clutter. Remove any items you have stored near the furnace, particularly anything likely to catch fire.
- Remove household items on top or in front of your air ducts and return vents.

HEATERS

- Ensure everything is kept 3 feet from the heater.
- Check your electric and gas heaters before you use them. If you suspect a fault, have the item checked by a qualified technician or replaced. Check all cords for fraying and damage. Plug heaters directly into wall sockets only.
- Do not overload the outlet.
- Ensure everything is kept 3 feet from the heater.
- Install any new heaters and use them per the manufacturer's instructions.
- Check your portable outdoor heaters before use and have them serviced or replaced if required. Ensure that the area where you plan to use them is level, well-ventilated, and away from awnings and other combustible materials.
- **NEVER** use any outdoor heating or cooking equipment inside your home, including charcoal and LPG, as a fuel source. This type of equipment is not suitable for indoor use and can lead to a build-up of lethal gases, which could be deadly. Check the manufacturer's recommendations before use.

HOW TO KEEP YOUR DRIVEWAY ENTRANCE FROM FILLING WITH SNOW

Throughout the winter months, State and Town snowplow crews will be out clearing the highways, roads and streets during and after each snowfall. Homeowners and other property owners will be clearing their driveways at the same time.

Many times while this is going on, a snowplow truck will go by and fill in the end of a freshly cleared private driveway with snow from the roadway. This is not intentional as snow banks are pushed back to the curb line in order to provide for adequate storage space for future storms.

The way this wintertime inconvenience can be minimized is to wait until the snow is pushed back all the way to the curb.



The diagram above shows how you can clear snow around the end of your driveway opening a certain way to reduce the possibility that you will have to do very much re-clearing after a snowplow truck goes by on the road next to your driveway.

The idea is to place as much snow as possible when clearing your driveway, in the direction of travel downstream on your side of the roadway. Next is to clear an area upstream from your driveway opening to form a "pocket" for the snow from the roadway to go into instead of at the end of your driveway.

The result is more of the snow accumulation from clearing the roadway will go into this open pocket area and less will wind up at the end of your driveway.

CALEA ACCREDITED

This past summer, the Bloomfield Police Department had an on-site assessment for national re-accreditation with the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). The Department was required to meet 484 nationally recognized professional standards of excellence to reach our goal. This ongoing process ensures that accredited agencies do not lapse in their commitment to excellence, but instead demonstrate consistency in procedures and operations over time. The two CALEA assessors assigned to review our department were impressed with our level of preparation, dedication, and professionalism. At the CALEA National Conference in Washington in November 11, 2023, the Bloomfield Police Department was officially awarded "Advanced Reaccreditation." The Police Department has the honor of being recognized as achieving a level of excellence that only 5% of departments in our nation have achieved.

This honor is the successful culmination of efforts to seek National Accreditation with the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies Inc. (CALEA). Created in 1979 through the combined efforts of four major law enforcement organizations: the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, the National Sheriffs' Association, and the Police Executive Research Forum, CALEA is widely recognized as the nation's official accreditation commission. The Commission's purpose is to develop law

enforcement standards and to establish and administer the accreditation program. The accreditation program establishes the process for a law enforcement agency to voluntarily demonstrate how they meet professionally-recognized criteria for excellence in management and service delivery.

The Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) helps Connecticut residents afford to heat their homes. Applications for CEAP typically take 30-45 minutes. Basic benefits towards your heating bill range between \$180 and \$530 depending on your situation. These benefits are usually paid directly to your utility company or fuel supplier. Households that heat with deliverable fuels like oil or propane may be eligible for additional free tank fills.

UPDATES FROM THE SENIOR CENTER

DUNCASTER COMMUNITY OUTREACH COMMITTEE GRANT AWARDED TO BLOOMFIELD SENIOR SERVICES

Bloomfield Senior Services has been awarded a \$3000 grant from the Duncaster Outreach Committee to support "Mindful Mix and Mingles". The grant will support two groups. "Mindfully Yours", a 6 week group will be offered to 20 aging ladies that wish to engage, express, create and enjoy positive peer support through the arts. The "Gentlemen's Breakfast Club" will provide an opportunity to bring 25 senior men together in a mutually supportive group experience that will include breakfast, a health oriented theme, distribution of health and wellness packets, followed by trips to the CT Air Museum and the Basketball Hall of Fame. Both group initiatives carry a mindful theme that encourages focusing on the present , not dwelling in the past and not worrying about the future. "Mindful Mix and Mingles" will be scheduled January through March of 2024.

AARP CONNECTICUT SIXTH LIVABLE COMMUNITIES GRANT AWARDED TO BLOOMFIELD SENIOR SERVICES

Bloomfield Senior Services is one of 9 Connecticut recipients to be awarded a grant from the AARP Connecticut Sixth Livable Communities Grant Program. The \$5000 grant will support the "Bloomfield Arts and Aging Project". Bloomfield Senior Services will offer a series of arts based adventures where participants can explore, engage, express, enjoy, learn and have fun while sharing meaningful group experiences with aging adults in the Bloomfield community.
